Something Borrowed, Something Blue

"Oh, they say when you marry in June you're a bride all your life, and the bridegroom who marries in June gets a sweet-heart for a wife. Winter weddings can be gay like a Christmas holiday, but the June Bride hears the song of a spring that lasts all summer long."

There is much tradition and folklore surrounding weddings and brides. June has long been a traditional month for weddings, in part because the weather tends to be lovely at this time of year. But did you know that the tradition of June weddings dates all the way back to Roman times? The word "June" is derived from Juno, the Roman goddess of love and marriage. The Romans believed that to marry in June meant the couple would be blessed by Juno with happiness and prosperity.

One of our favorite old-time wedding traditions is the "society column." Wedding announcements in newspapers came into fashion in the latter part of the nineteenth century, and focused primarily on high-society couples. But as time went by, even more modest weddings began to get the "society" treatment in small-town papers, bringing attention to the delicate details that made each wedding beautiful and unique. Consider this write up in the June 25, 1924 edition of the *New Glarus Post*:

"...Miss Alma Vogeli, daughter of Mrs. and Mrs. Mathias Vogeli of Monticello, became the bride of Edward J. Gmur, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Gmur of New Glarus.... The bride wore a pretty gown of white stain charmeuse and Spanish silk lace, with a veil of Spanish white tulle draped gracefully over her head. She carried a shower bouquet of butterfly roses, pink sweet peas, and lilies of the valley."

Such attention to detail can turn even the humblest of weddings into front-page news.


Music in New Glarus By Abigail Biank

From the beginning of its Swiss heritage, New Glarus community and culture have been shaped by music. Polka, the Mannerchor, dances, local events, the school music program, and others have all contributed to a lively music scene in New Glarus, well-documented throughout the years in the newspaper. The papers are full of notices over the years advertising many different musical performances and thanking various groups for providing their music for town functions. Certain names are repeated often, including "Olson's 6-Piece Orchestra". While details about this group are nearly impossible to find, Olson's 6-Piece Orchestra is credited with performing at dances and parties in paper after paper, mainly in the early 1930s.

Another music name that shows up over and over is J.A. Hughes, the school band director for many years. What the J and A stand for are not provided, nor are many details about this man available. But he is clearly one of the heroes of New Glarus Music. The first notice I could find about J.A. Hughes directing the New Glarus school band was the August 17, 1932, Post, stating that Hughes would be directing the band again. While I could not find start or end dates for Hughes' career as New Glarus High School Bandmaster, his name shows up continuously through the 1930s as heavily involved in New Glarus music. The Ball Club thanked him for his community support in the October 14, 1931, Post. He appears to have been socially active in Green County and is listed as participating in various local happenings, such as when he, his wife, and several other couples attended an outing at Lake Kegonsa in the Spring of 1932, duly noted in the June 1, 1932 paper. The newspaper even described the bandmaster's Silver Wedding Anniversary in the August 3, 1932 Post edition. The couple was presented with a silver tea set. J.A. Hughes took the High School band to state in the spring of 1931. The next spring the band headed to the Waupun District Tournament in WI Rapids under Hughes' leadership. The April 4, 1932 Post informed New Glarus that the band invested in new uniforms for this important occasion. The new uniforms were royal blue and lined with red silk. Hughes took the band to various contests and directed their many concerts, regularly advertised in the Post. Year after year J.A. Hughes was declared to be the bandmaster for the school year and complimented on the efficiency and success of his previous years. Hughes was not just involved in New Glarus, but worked with bands all over Green County, sometimes even bringing them together for group performances and helping to lead Green County Fair music. Simply from references in the newspapers, it is clear that J.A. Hughes was something of a local music celebrity and was extremely dedicated to the advancement of music in New Glarus and Green County. Mr. Hughes should be remembered as a hero of Green County music in the 1930s.
