

Swiss Historical Village & Museum, New Glarus, Wisconsin Settler's Prairie Library Program – August 16, 2022

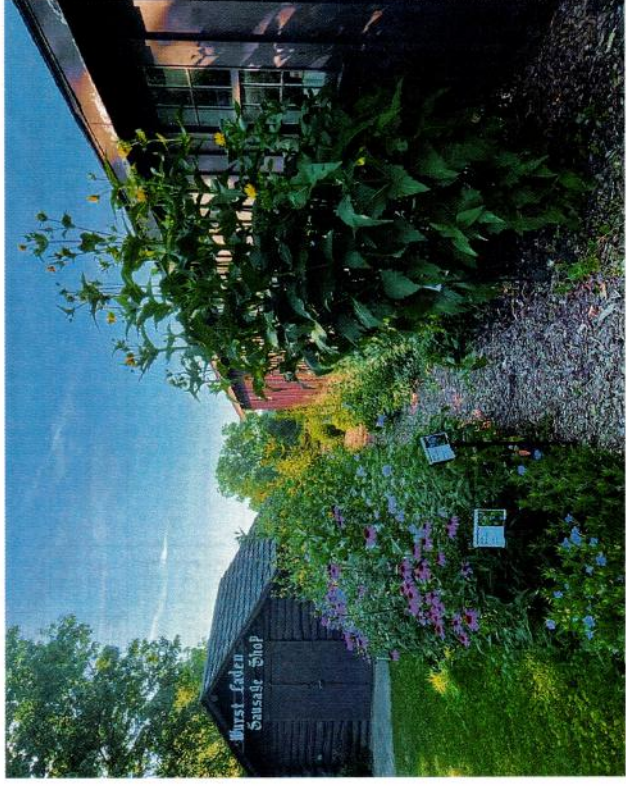
The prairie plot project began in 2015 as a collaboration between the Green County Master Gardener Association (GCMGA) and the Swiss Historical Village & Museum. The idea was to recreate how the land appeared in 1845 when the immigrants from Glarus, Switzerland, traveled from Mineral Point to the land that became New Glarus, hence the name 'Settler's Prairie'. All of the plants are native to Green or Dane County.

The garden is maintained by Certified Master Gardeners from the UW-Madison Extension Master Gardener Program, who volunteer for the New Glarus Historical Society. The volunteer work consists of identifying plants, weeding, deadheading, adding new plants, replanting, mulching, thinning of certain species, & educational outreach.
